

One story goes that the idea took root in Senora's mind while she listened to a Mother' Day sermon in 1909. Senora's mother had died in childbirth and she and her siblings were raised by their father with lots of affection. She felt strongly that fathers should be honoured with a day of

their own.

With the help of the Young Men's Christian Association (YMCA), Senora began a vigorous campaign to celebrate Father's Day in the US. Due to her efforts, the first Fathers' Day was celebrated in 1910 and slowly the celebrations started to spread across the globe.

Today Fathers' Day is celebrated every 3rd Sunday in June. This year the date is June 21. For the month of June, Mutual Insurance BVI showed it's appreciation to our clients who are fathers, by presenting them with special tokens. We wish them and all fathers Happy Father's Day.

Did you Know...?

Creole languages are nearly two hundred years old. They came about during the first slavery era in the Caribbean. Creole is a "patois" language that is a varied combination of African syntax and European lexicon, or words. Because the Creole language was associated with the poor labor class, parents would often forbid their children to speak it.

Barbados, a former British colony, retains enough British traditions to be called "Little England."

The Dominican Republic is largely underdeveloped except in the capital of Santo Domingo, a city teeming with two million people. It is a sparsely populated, mountainous country whose past is riddled with political turmoil.

In contrast, nearby Puerto Rico is the most modern island in the Caribbean. Spanish and American influences are apparent throughout this island abounding with high-rises and traffic.
